Over the last two years, the National Eucharistic Revival has ushered the Catholic faithful into a greater faith and appreciation for the amazing sacramental gift of our Lord, who draws us to himself through our communion in his Body and Blood. As a practical way to incarnate the grace of the Revival into our families and communities, the bishops of California are dedicating the 2024-2025 pastoral year to helping the Catholic faithful renew and deepen our lived experience of the Sacrament of Marriage – which is modeled on the irrevocable covenantal love of God for his people expressed in the Eucharist.

Under the title "Radiate Love," every Catholic community is invited to participate in this initiative, starting on World Marriage Day – February 11, 2024 – when couples all over the globe are called by God to invest in their relationships and let that love radiate out to the whole world, first and foremost in their own family. This soft launch of the initiative will be followed by monthly reflections, prayers, and other materials to help form the faith of Catholics of all ages, beginning in July, 2024.

The materials in this packet are designed for the soft launch, and there will be additional packets from the California Catholic Conference arriving quarterly as we progress through the pastoral year. Intercessions and Blessing for World Marriage Day February 11, 2024

General Intercessions

For all married couples, may they always cling to one another through the joys and sorrows of life, and may they experience growth and healing to radiate the perfect love of God as the source, example, and final destiny of their mutual love.

For young adults, may the living models of healthy and real married couples and parents in our community inspire in them a lively hope for a committed, faithful, and lifelong love, rooted in the love of Christ.

After Communion

Optional: Invite a married couple to briefly share (suggest 3 minutes) after the Communion Rite how the Sacrament of Marriage has been a blessing for them through the ups and downs of life.

Blessing after Communion: After reciting the Prayer after Communion, invite all the married couples in the parish to stand and receive a blessing in the following or similar words:

Almighty and eternal God, You blessed the union of married couples so that they might radiate your love and reflect the union of Christ with his Church: look now with kindness on them.

Renew their marriage covenant, increase your love in them, and strengthen their bond of peace so that, with their children, they may always rejoice in the gift of your blessing.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

February 11, 2024 - Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time and World Marriage Day (https://bible.usccb.org/bible/readings/021124.cfm)

First Reading: Leviticus 13:1-2, 44-46 – those who suffer from leprosy are to dwell apart Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 32:1-2, 5, 11 – I turn to you, Lord, in time of trouble Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 10:31-11:1 – Whatever you do, do everything for the glory of God... not seeking my own benefit but that of the many, that they may be saved.

Gospel: Mark 1:40-45 – Healing of the leper: "If you wish, you can make me clean." Jesus stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, "I do will it. Be made clean."

Note to Pastors and Homilists: This year, World Marriage Day serves as a "soft launch" for the *Radiate Love* initiative in Catholic dioceses, parishes, and schools throughout California. Starting in July 2024, one Sunday each month will break open a key theme related to marriage to help our Catholic people to understand, celebrate, nurture, and live this sacrament given to us by God for our holiness and eternal salvation. In parishes, this means there will be multiple resources available to enhance the formation in complementary ways: homily helps, prayers of the faithful, prayer cards, bulletin inserts, family activities, social media, videos from our bishops, and occasional parish activities (i.e. blessings, catechetical events, gifts for couples, etc.). Many of those types of tools are available to deploy in this parish resource packet.

As you prepare your homily for this weekend, the focus should be broadly on the celebration of World Marriage Day, and in particular on the *Radiate Love* initiative. You should feel free to utilize any and all of the materials as reference points (bulletin insert, prayer card, blessing, videos, etc.), as well as the core ideas and scriptural connections outlined below. Notably, the average number of Catholic weddings in California over the last three years (2020 to 2022) has declined by 33% from the 2012 level. Nevertheless, it is not necessary to address every concept. Use pastoral sensitivity to the needs of your community to weave the themes together in a way that will make the most sense for your people. Keep in mind that the soft launch is not the time to focus too much on negatives and challenges. The goal here is to provide a heartfelt and positive invitation to grow together in the journey ahead that will expound the Good News about the Sacrament of Matrimony for our families and for the world. In future months, there will be opportunities to explore the demands and beauty of Christian marriage, as well as how it is distinct—and better for us—than popular ideas about marriage in evolving social attitudes.

Theme: World Marriage Day - Radiate Love - Together We Thrive

Celebration of World Marriage Day

Every year as St. Valentine's Day approaches, we take time to appreciate the great loves in our lives, whether they be friendships, romantic relationships, or our lifelong spouse—the one with whom we choose to build a family. And so naturally, the second Sunday of February is the day we celebrate World Marriage Day. The purpose of World Marriage Day is to emphasize the beauty of marriage and to honor husbands and wives for their faithfulness and sacrifices. • What does this have to do with today's readings about the healing of leprosy? In popular culture, St. Valentine's Day romanticizes marriage and the love of spouses, but the reality of married love is that it is not always smooth sailing. Nevertheless, as Catholics we celebrate the indissolubility of marriage—meaning that it is an exclusive, faithful, and lifelong relationship—because that commitment gives spouses a great freedom to be fully themselves with each other. It is a beautiful gift, given in faith, hope, and love, and it is good news for a world that is becoming more and more skeptical about the bonds of human love and family life. But it also requires a lifelong openness to change and to grow. Every married couple understands that we sometimes fall short of our commitments and ideals, and those are the moments when we most need the healing touch and guidance of Jesus Christ, just like the leper in today's Gospel. As Pope Francis has said, "God's indulgent love always accompanies our human journey; through grace, it heals and transforms hardened hearts, leading them back to the beginning through the way of the cross." (Amoris Laetitia, 62)



• The Eucharist is the source of strength and renewal for married couples

In this year of Eucharistic Revival, we often forget that our celebration at the Table of the Lord is also a foretaste of the Wedding Banquet that we will all share in Heaven. At that banquet, Jesus Christ is both the sacrificial Lamb of God and the Bridegroom, and in Baptism we have all put on our white bridal gown in the form of our baptismal garment, because as Church we are all together the Bride of Christ! It is that relationship, between Jesus and all of us who are baptized, that serves as the model and guide for every Christian marriage. (Eph 5:31-32) By the first week of February, the CCC will post a short video from Bishop Soto (Sacramento) on this aspect at www.radiatelove.info.

As spouses, we are renewed and restored in the love of Christ, just as the leper was. Also like the leper, we are called to let that healing love radiate into the world around us, to strengthen the hope of the young generation and restore the shine to the love of older couples. Perhaps you know some young couples who have taken the step to live together, but without the benefit of public commitment and sacramental grace. The Gospel of God's love in Jesus Christ invites the married couples in our community to joyfully give witness to the goodness and beauty of married life, drawing young couples to say "I want what they have." This is a challenging and worthy goal, but we all may fall short at times. A great way to respond would be for couples to come together before the Lord in the Eucharist and repeat the words of the leper: "Lord, if you wish, you can make us clean."

• Radiate Love – The witness of marriage is not just for the couple—it is for the world! Being made clean and restored in Christ is a real sacramental grace, but it is up to us to follow through and bring it to life through practices of loving kindness, forgiveness, and mercy. It may be difficult and even daunting at times, but it is always worth the effort—you are worth the effort, and so is your spouse! And the part that we often forget is that marriage is not just for the couple—it is also a grace for their children, and it is a sign of the Good News of Christ for the whole world. John Paul II, Familiaris Consortio, n. 17: "The family has the mission to become more and more what it is, that is to say, a community of life and love, in an effort that will find fulfillment, as will everything created and redeemed, in the Kingdom of God. Looking at it in such a way as to reach its very roots, we must say that the essence and role of the family are in the final analysis specified by love. Hence the family has the mission to guard, reveal and communicate love, and this is a living reflection of and a real sharing in God's love for humanity and the love of Christ the Lord for the Church His bride."

Countless studies have demonstrated beyond a shadow of doubt the enduring value and importance of marriage in forming responsible and healthy adults, well-behaved and successful children, and cohesive, lively communities. By their love, married couples and families give witness to the love of God. Today in particular, Catholic couples all over the world are called by God to invest in their relationships, and to let that love radiate to the whole world, starting with their children. The world nowadays is desperately seeking inspiring and healthy examples and models to follow. As Catholics, Pope Francis says that we are called to be "joyful messengers of challenging proposals, guardians of the goodness and beauty which shine forth in a life of fidelity to the Gospel." (Evangelii Gaudium, 168)

With that in mind, our California Bishops are united in their desire this year to equip us all to bear witness to the gift of the Sacrament of Matrimony—for couples, for their children, for our Church, and for the world. Please take home the prayer cards you will find in the pews (if applicable), and also take some time to read and discuss the bulletin insert. Above all, appreciate the loving married couples who have inspired you in your life, and if you are married, share with your spouse some practical ways that you can Radiate Love at home, at work, in the parish, and in the world.

Saint Thomas More, Martyr for the Sacrament of Marriage

(for Flocknote or other similar parish communication on February 11, 2024)

Born in London in 1478 as the son of a prominent lawyer and judge, Saint Thomas More received a classical education and pursued higher studies in law. He would become a prominent public servant in his own right, renowned for his brilliance and moral honesty. He married Jane Colt of Essex in 1505, and they had four children together. When she died of a sudden illness in 1511, he quickly married a widow named Alice Middleton so that his children would not long suffer the lack of a loving mother. Their home was always open to others in need, especially children—they welcomed two girls as wards and raised them as their own.

When King Henry VIII declared himself "Supreme Head of the Church," St. Thomas opposed the king's designs, especially with regard to divorce. He refused to take an oath acknowledging the children of King Henry and Anne Boleyn as legitimate heirs to the throne, so he was accused of treason and sentenced to death by beheading in 1534. Thus, he became a martyr for the Sacrament of Marriage.

Reflection questions for couples:

- How does the example of Saint Thomas More and his wives inspire or challenge us to grow in our commitment and love for one another?
- How does their witness inform our calling to nurture the life of the next generation, whether they be our own children or those of others?
- What more can we do to radiate love as a couple—at home, at church, and in the world?
